The Power of Hope: Operation Fuel's Commitment to Connecticut



For nearly fifty years, Operation Fuel has acted as a lifeline for Connecticut families, providing emergency energy and water assistance to households facing hardship. Our mission is clear: to lead the way so future generations can thrive with secure access to heat, power, and water. In our fiscal year 2024 alone, we distributed **over \$4.6 million in aid to 8,411 households**, making a tangible difference in the lives of thousands of residents.

As the need for assistance continues to grow, we are rising to the challenge. Despite funding limitations, we remain committed to finding solutions and expanding our reach. Last year, the Connecticut legislature unanimously voted to provide emergency funds to extend our winter season. The funds helped an additional 3,300 households who may have otherwise been turned away.

This year, the demand for our services has been greater than ever. When our energy assistance application portal opened on January 27, we saw an unprecedented response: more than 1,500 households applied within the first week. The continued rise in need underscores the importance of our work and the impact we continue to have across the state of Connecticut. As utility costs rise and economic pressures continue to mount, we will continue to work towards a future where no Connecticut household is forced to choose between heating their home and paying for other essentials.

However, Operation Fuel is more than just emergency assistance—we are advocates for long-term solutions. Our policy team is actively working with legislators and policymakers at the Legislature, sharing the real stories of Connecticut residents who are struggling to afford basic energy costs. By pushing for sustainable funding and systemic change, we are striving to create a future where energy insecurity is a thing of the past. 

Equity, Accessibility, and Stakeholder Engagement at PURA

At Operation Fuel, we partner and collaborate with legislative and state officials, social service agencies, utilities, delivered fuel vendors, and other stakeholders to develop policies that reduce energy and water burdens for Connecticut residents.

Over the next year, Operation Fuel will actively participate in a new Public Utilities Regulatory Authority (PURA) proceeding that seeks to improve opportunities for more Connecticut residents to participate in the decision-making process. PURA is especially seeking the perspectives of low-income residential customers and those who experience high energy burden.

Partnerships Change Lives



New Haven resident, Ms. Severino, relies on Social Security as her sole income. She was recently faced with overwhelming challenges following the loss of her mother and brother, both of whom had lived with her. With limited access to phone, internet, or transportation, Ms. Severino struggled to address serious issues in her home, including a nonfunctional and leaking oil tank, refrigerator, and stove.

Ms. Severino turned to the I Heart My Home program through Neighborhood Housing Services of New Haven (NHS) and Operation Fuel for help. NHS guided Ms. Severino every step of the way, securing funding from the Home Energy Solutions-Income Eligible (HES-IE) program, a state energy efficiency initiative funded by ratepayers and managed by utility companies. Operation Fuel stepped in to support improvements that HES-IE funding allows, ensuring no necessary work was missed. As a result, this partnership brought several upgrades to her home including mold

remediation, insulation, venting, and the installation of a high-efficiency heat pump.

Thanks to the collaborative efforts of I Heart My Home, Operation Fuel, and local contractors, Ms. Severino's home is now more safe, efficient, and livable. Her story underscores the impact of community support programs in providing critical care assistance and creating lasting change for vulnerable residents during challenging times.
